KILLED AT PERALTA.

**Sanchez Accidentally Shot
 Charge of His Own Gun.**

Sanchez, the 12-year-old son of Sanchez of Yorba, was shot yesterday afternoon about near Peralta by the accidental discharge of his own gun as he was handling it while talking to his companion. Young Sanchez and his companion were hunting in a field near Peralta and while stopping to talk young Sanchez leaned on a stump with his hands over the muzzle of the barrels pointing straight ahead. According to the evidence the lad who was with Sanchez was the latter while leaning on the stump he had the hammers with his hands and was discharging the weapon to be discharged striking Sanchez fairly and killing him instantly. A coroner's inquest was held last evening and a verdict returned that decedent died from a gunshot wound inflicted in some unknown manner. A funeral was held this afternoon and interment made at Yorba.

SUICIDE AT PLACENTIA.

**Veteran of the Civil War Ends His
 Life With Overdose of
 Morphine.**

F. R. Moore, veteran of the civil war and for some time resident of Fullerton and Placentia, committed suicide Wednesday night by taking morphine. Moore was working for O'Donnel & Barker in the capacity of cook and had been in their employ for several months. He had seemingly been in low spirits for some time, but nothing particular was thought of it and no fears entertained that he would attempt to take his own life. Yesterday morning, however, Moore was found in bed in an unconscious condition and from a letter written by him and addressed to one of his employers it was learned that he had taken morphine with suicidal intent. Moore never recovered consciousness and died last night. An inquest was held this morning by Coroner George S. Smith and a verdict returned by the jury that decedent came to his death by a dose of morphine taken with suicidal intent. Moore was a veteran of the civil war and is said to have been educated for the ministry and to have at one time been a minister of the Methodist church. For some years he had been in straightened circumstances and at length was forced to accept any kind of odd jobs that offered. The letter left by the unfortunate man contained the request that his body should be buried by the Methodists at Anaheim and the request was granted and the funeral held this afternoon.

SENTENCED TO TWO YEARS.
